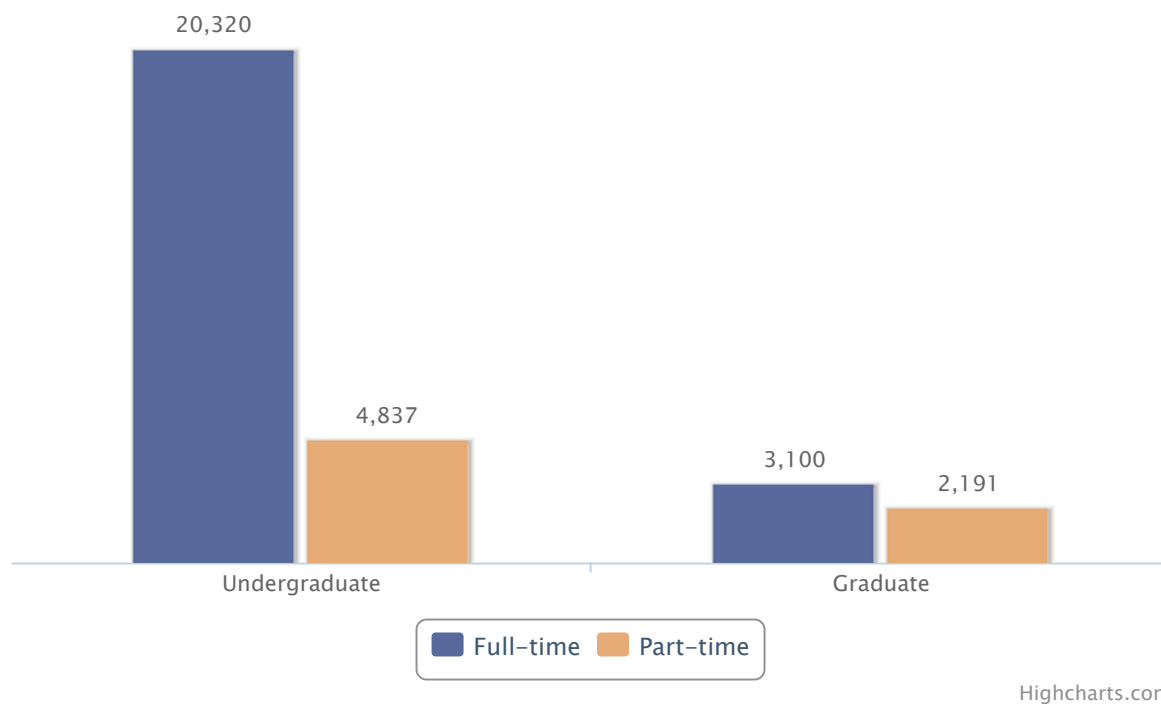

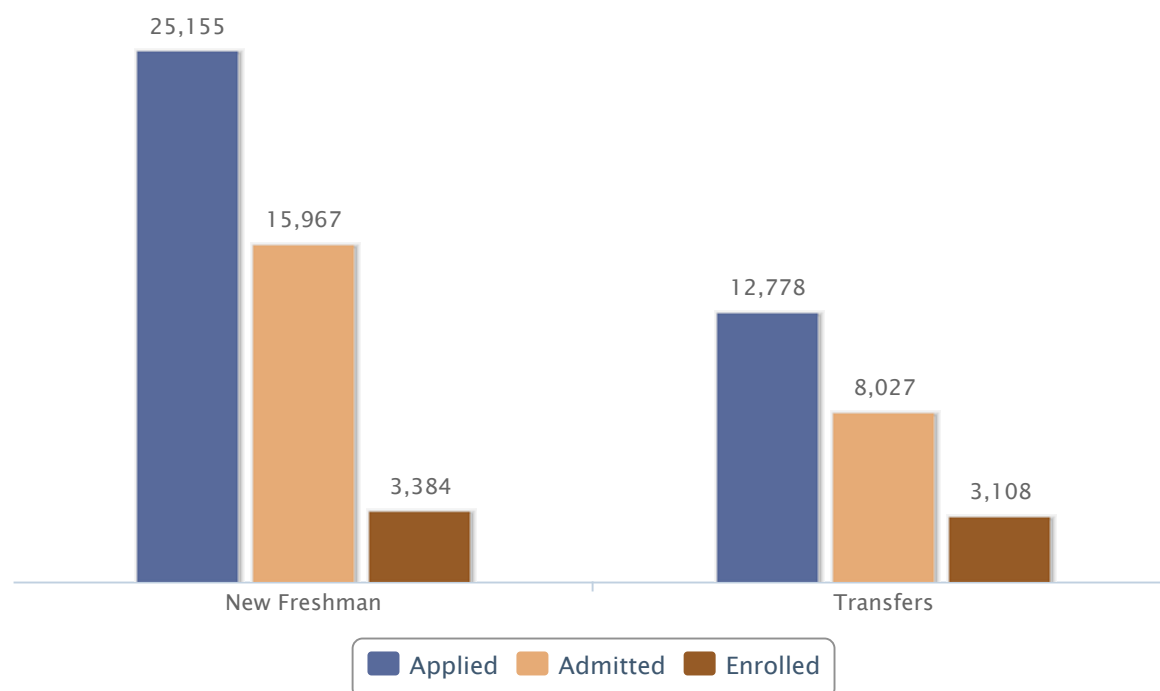

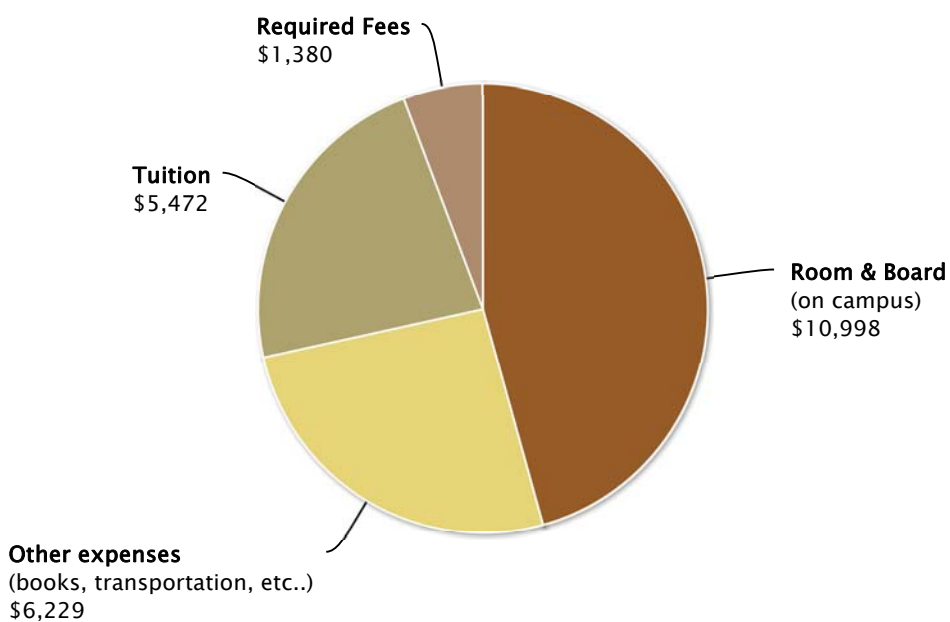
Typical Undergraduate In-State Costs for 2012-13 without Financial Aid (Full-Time, In-State Students)

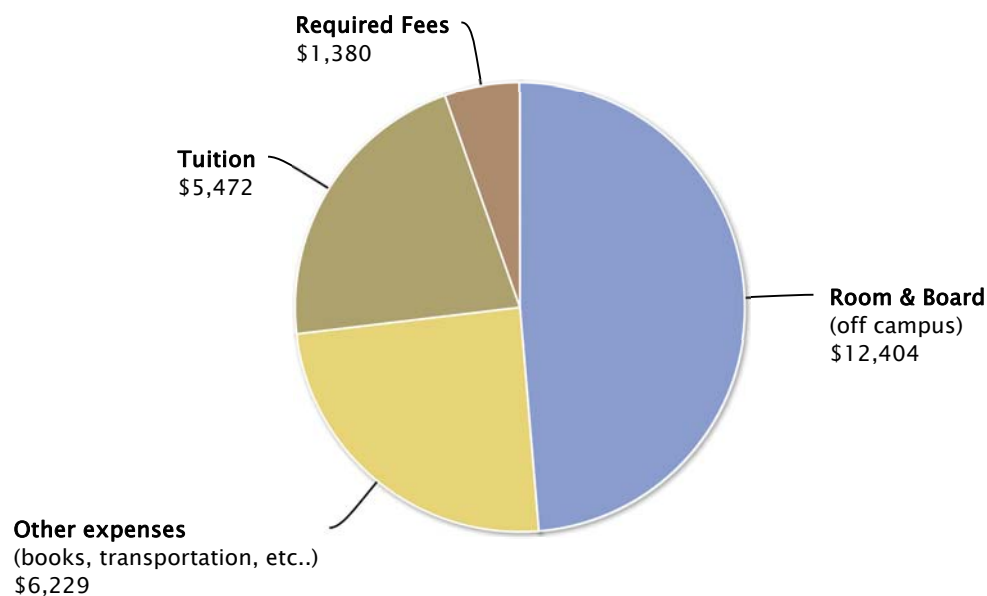

Financial Aid: How much help is there to pay?

Scholarships & Grants

- For Fall 2011, 45% of full-time beginning undergraduate students received an average of \$9,278 in grant or scholarship aid from the federal or state government or the institution.

Scholarships and grants are financial aid that does not need to be repaid and is sometimes referred to as gift aid.

Aid that must be repaid: Loans

- For Fall 2011, 46% of full-time beginning undergraduate students received an average of \$5,205 in loans for their first year and 100% of students receiving loans received federal loans.

Loans need to be repaid. Typically, repayment starts once you are no longer enrolled full-time. Please refer to page 12 of the Funding Education Beyond High School guide on the US Department of Education's Federal Student Aid website for more information about Financial Need.

- 35% of graduates from San José State University in 2011-12 borrowed at some time during their undergraduate studies. The average amount borrowed for those who borrowed at all was \$4,175. The loan payment for this amount over 10-years at 5.25% APR is approximately \$43 per month. Individual loan repayment terms may vary, please consult the SJSU Financial Aid office for additional information about loan options.



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Sticker Price: How much does it cost on average?

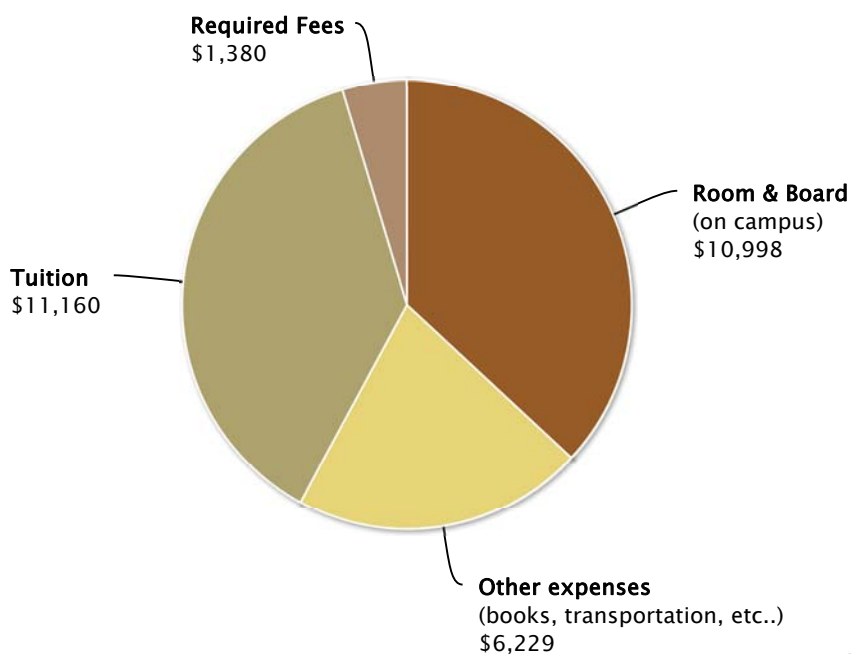
Typical Undergraduate Out-of-State Costs for 2012-13 without Financial Aid (Full-Time, Out-of-state Students)

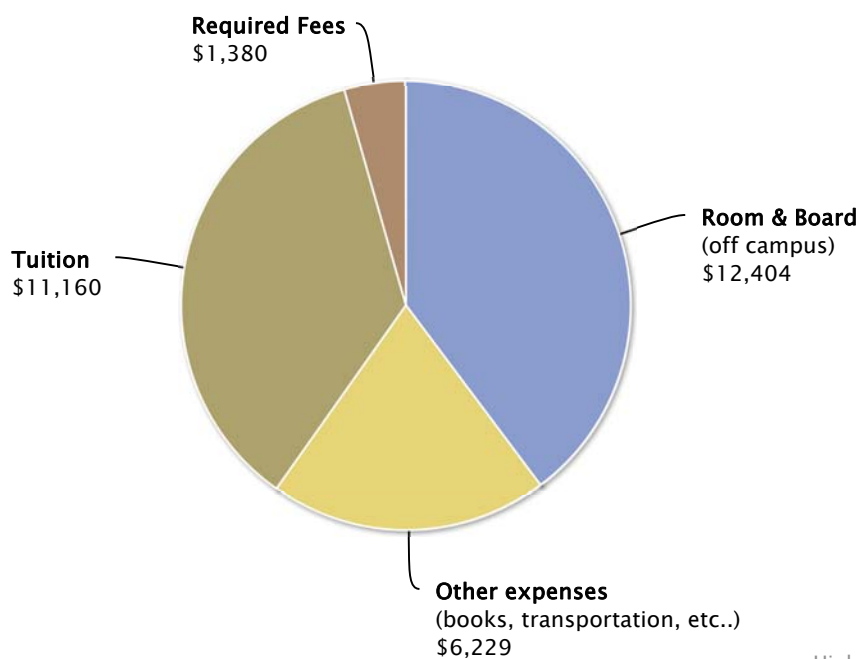

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Student Activities and Involvement at SJSU

Students who are actively involved in their own learning and development are more likely to be successful in college. Colleges and universities offer students a wide variety of opportunities both inside and outside the classroom to become engaged with new ideas, people, and experiences. Institutions measure the effectiveness of these opportunities in a variety of ways to better understand what types of activities and programs students find the most helpful.

Institutions participating in the VSA program measure student involvement on campus using one of four national surveys. Results from the one survey are reported for a common set of questions selected as part of VSA. Following are the selected results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE). The questions have been grouped together in categories that are known to contribute to student learning and development. The results reported below are based on the responses of seniors who participated in the survey.

Group Learning Experiences

- 92.0% percent of seniors worked with classmates on assignments outside of class.
- 46.0% of seniors tutored or taught other students
- 21.0% of seniors spent at least 6 hours per week participating in co-curricular activities such as student organizations and intramural sports

Active Learning Experiences

- 86.0% of seniors spent at least 6 hours per week preparing for class
- 11.0% of seniors worked on a research project with a faculty member
- 34.0% of seniors participated in an internship, practicum, or field experience
- 55.0% of seniors participated in community service or volunteer work
- 11.0% of seniors participated in study abroad
- 94.0% of seniors made at least one class presentation last year

Institutional Commitment to Student Learning and Success

- 76.0% of seniors believe this institution provides support for student success
- 60.0% of seniors rated the quality of academic advising at this institution as good or excellent
- 56.0% of seniors reported that this institution provided help in coping with work, family and other non-academic responsibilities
- 91.0% of seniors reported working harder than they thought they could to meet an instructor's standards or expectations

Student Interaction with Campus Faculty and Staff

- 36.0% of seniors believed that the campus staff were helpful, considerate, or flexible
- 70.0% of seniors believed that faculty are available, helpful, or sympathetic
- 92.0% of seniors reported that faculty members provided prompt feedback on their academic performance
- 59.0% of seniors discussed readings or ideas with faculty members outside of class

Experiences with Diverse Groups of People and Ideas

- 65.0% of seniors reported that they often tried to understand someone else's point of view
- 88.0% of seniors reported their experience at this institution contributed to their understanding people of other racial and ethnic backgrounds
- 58.0% of seniors often had serious conversations with students of a different race or ethnicity

Student Satisfaction

- 75.0% of seniors would attend this institution if they started over again
- 77.0% of seniors rated their entire educational experience as good or excellent
- 75.0% of seniors reported that other students were friendly or supportive

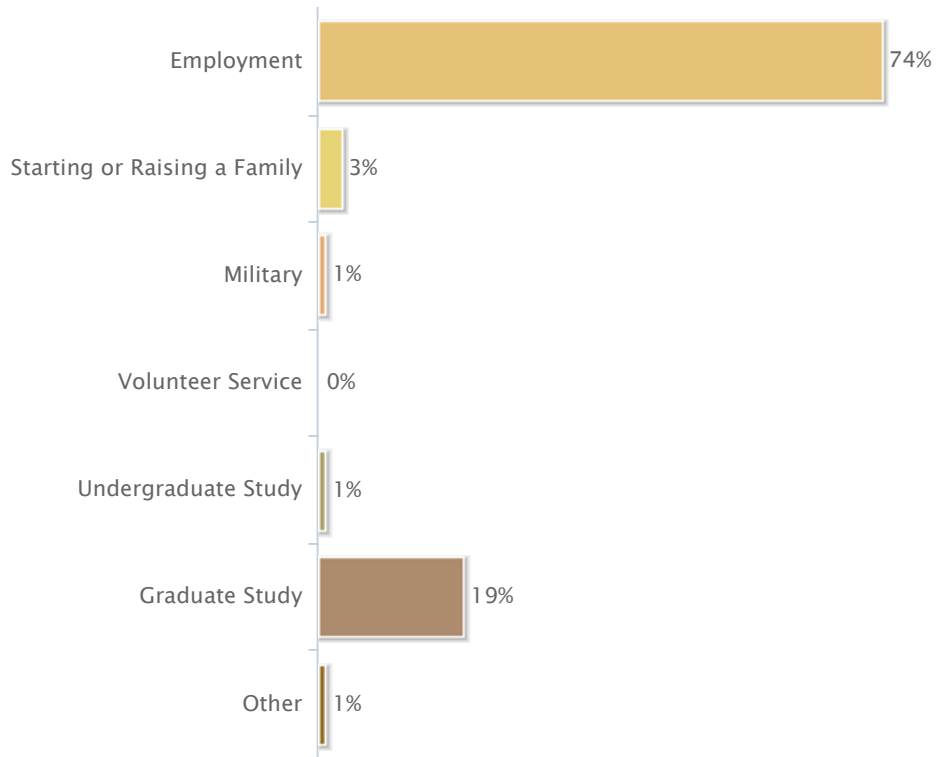

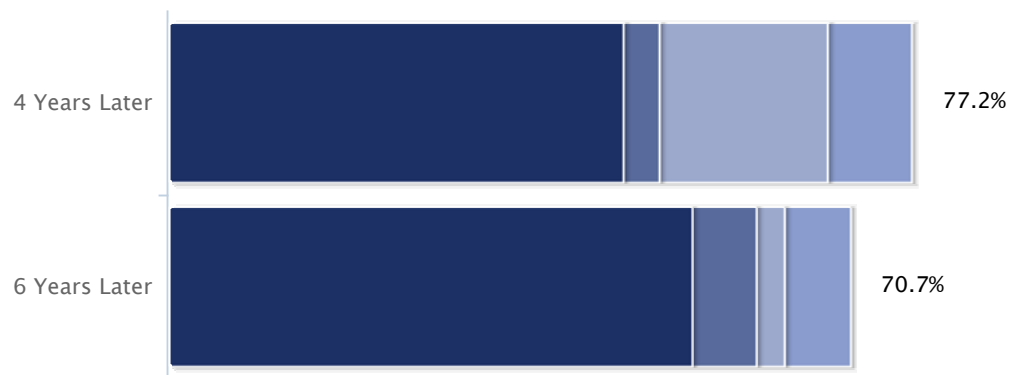
First Time Full-Time Students Starting Fall 2006

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San José State University Learning Outcomes

As part of San José State University's commitment to graduating well educated students, assessment of student learning is integrated into all components of the curriculum. The development of student learning outcomes for courses, degree programs, and general education is overseen by committees at the department, college, and university levels. Assessment of student learning is likewise a shared responsibility at each of these levels and is overseen by the Associate Vice Presidents for Undergraduate Studies and for Graduate Studies and Research with the support of the Director of Assessment and assessment coordinators for each of the seven colleges.

Why did you choose the CLA for your institutional assessment?

The Collegiate Learning Assessment (CLA) measures critical thinking, analytic reasoning, problem solving, and written communication using a performance task and an analytic writing task. The scores from the tasks are reported separately below.

Which San José State University students are assessed? When?

First-time Freshmen are assessed during the fall semester and native seniors are assessed during the spring semester.

How are assessment data collected?

The innovative CLA performance measures require three-hours of testing time; all measures are administered on-line on campus computer facilities. SJSU will have 300 first-year students participate in this study. The academic progress of these students will be tracked during their attendance at SJSU to participate in these repeated assessments. The project will build a link between educational research and practice by creating a Collegiate Learning Assessment Database that

can be used to conduct research about student learning and best practices, and that will inform curricular and programmatic design and planning.

How are data reported within San José State University?

Data are used to compose an executive level report comparing the value-added, of various constructs, over the various years of administration.

How have data led to program changes and improvements at SJSU?

Information is not available.



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Of 3947 freshmen students eligible to be tested, 113 (3%) were included in the tested sample at San José State University.

Of 10433 senior students eligible to be tested, 106 (1%) were included in the tested sample at San José State University.

Probability sampling, where a small randomly selected sample of a larger population can be used to estimate the learning gains in the entire population with statistical confidence, provides the foundation for campus-level student learning outcomes assessment at many institutions. It's important, however, to review the demographics of the tested sample of students to ensure that the proportion of students within a given group in the tested sample is close to the proportion of students in that group in the total population. Differences in proportions don't mean the results aren't valid, but they do mean that institutions need to use caution in interpreting the results for the groups that are under-represented in the tested sample.

The VSA provides sample size guidelines for institutions based on a 95% confidence interval and 5% margin of error. So long as the tested sample demographics represent the student body, this means we can be 95% certain that the “true” population learning outcomes are with +/- 5% of the reported results. 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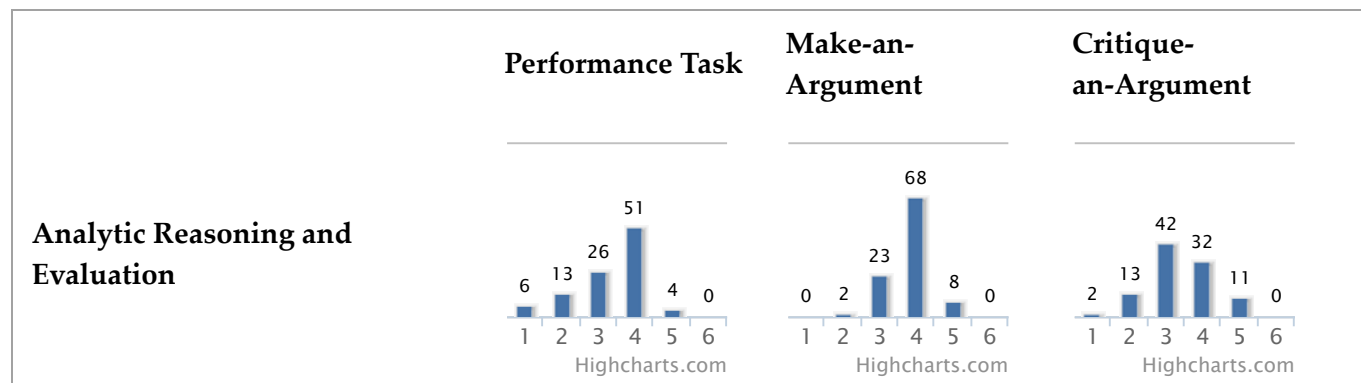
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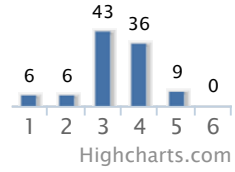
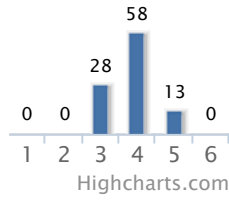
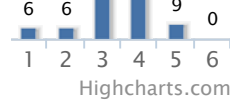
The increase in learning on the performance task is at or near what would be expected at an institution testing students of similar academic abilities.

The increase in learning on the analytic writing task is at or near what would be expected at an institution testing students of similar academic abilities.

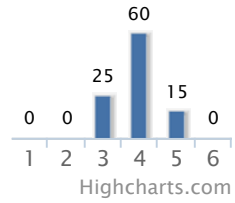
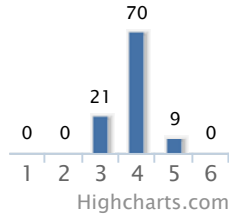
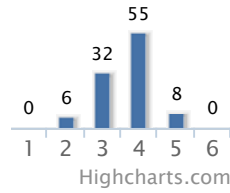
